# FROM THE PTA PRESIDENT

Hello Clinton Families,

On the evening of Tuesday, January 12<sup>th</sup>, an earthquake in Haiti caused complete devastation and took the lives of thousands. This event has hit close to home as many of our students have close family in Haiti. We are thankful that many of our students have heard from their families, but we're devastated that so many people are suffering from losing loved ones or having their homes destroyed.

On January 21<sup>st</sup>, parents, children, staff, and community members joined together to offer support to our Haitian community. Clinton School hosted an evening to reach out to those in our school district who have been affected by this tragedy. Sponsored by the Parenting Center, the gathering drew almost 200 people. Dinner was donated by a local restaurant, the Village Trattoria, and by the district PTAs, and was served to all in attendance. Adults were then given the opportunity to talk to social workers as younger children talked to middle and high school students while making friendship bracelets. As we move forward as a school community, and as a PTA, we should remain committed to doing what we can to ease the pain that has been caused by this earthquake. On **February 25**th, Clinton School will host another similar event, also sponsored by the Parenting Center.

Clinton school students have also begun to raise funds for Haiti relief. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade class began collecting change for UNICEF. Each 5<sup>th</sup> grader has brought home UNICEF boxes to collect change. They have placed posters and boxes in each classroom throughout the school. All students have the opportunity to bring in change to be used in the Haiti relief effort.

Every year the Student Government sells Candy Grams for Valentine's Day. This year, proceeds are being donated to a Haiti relief fund. Please support our student government in this worthy endeavor.

Clinton School prides itself on being a strong community that works together to nurture our children. During this difficult time, when many in our community are suffering, please do what you can to support them and the Haiti relief effort.

**Kindergarten** Mrs. Shelffo's class has exciting plans for the month of February. Students will take a field trip to the Paper Mill Playhouse to see a performance of *Max and Ruby*. This month they also will be celebrating Valentine's Day, and they will be making collections of 100 to celebrate the 100th day of school. In addition, as part of the science curriculum, students have been having fun experimenting with magnets in the classroom.

**First Grade** Students in Mrs. Moskowitz's and Ms. Zalinski's class greeted 2010 by learning about nutrition and the five food groups. They created a poem about healthy eating with poet Judith Natelli McLaughlin, who visited the class to read from her poetry collection, *Poems on Fruits and Odes to Veggies*. Students have also been learning about penguins and other creatures of Antarctica and are also mastering addition and subtraction.

Mrs. Cutrufello's class joined other first graders in starting a nightly writing activity called "Night Write." This writing activity seeks to develop writing fluency and strengthen the children's writing stamina through regular writing practice. The children are enjoying writing about their favorite topics twice a week. Parents are encouraged to "coach" their children in a positive way by asking children to read their stories aloud and share what they liked about the topic.

The class is also beginning to write a series of nonfiction books. The first books will be about mammals, amphibians, and reptiles. The books are primarily researched and written in school during writing workshop time. Students are also enjoying having their parents come into the class to read books for "Favorite Book Fridays."

The class welcomed a new student teacher, Rachel Henderson. Ms. Henderson is a student at Kean University where she's seeking a Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education.

Second Grade Second graders have been busy writing! They have been writing nonfiction pieces, including "How-to-Books" and "All-About Books," in which they teach others about a subject. In social studies, students are learning about how to improve their communities. Students will learn even more about writing nonfiction through an exciting project; they will research and write about famous African Americans. After the individual projects have been completed they will be put together to make a quilt, which will be proudly displayed in the hallways. Look for the quilt in February!

Top-of-the-line models are the Fisker Karma (you'll feel 20 years younger!) and the Tesla Model S (long a favorite of the rich and eco-conscious). The practical, affordable all-American Ford Focus smells like success, but the favorite to win is the Chevy Volt, coming out at the end of this year. Zipping out of the gate at 40 miles on a single charge, Detroit may stand tall in the saddle in 2010.

By the way, the old "Drive 55" campaign originated by Jimmy Carter still holds true today. Driving 55 mph saves gas, roads, and lives.

# 2010 SOMEF GRANTS

SOMEF (The South Orange Maplewood Education Foundation) recently announced their teacher grants for 2010 and educators from all 9 South Orange/Maplewood schools received 52 Teacher Grants totaling \$41,173 for their spring projects. Several Clinton teachers were recipients and as always, we are very grateful to SOMEF for the essential support they provide.

Our kindergarten teachers (Ann Cosmas, Rebecca Antunes, Mary Shelffo, Cris Swan, and Diana Dadaian) received funds to create a Poetry Center for our kindergarten students. This center will support the NJ Reading Standards and our district's Language Arts Curriculum by creating a visually enticing Poetry Center in each of our four kindergarten classrooms.

Third grade teacher Joseph Ferriero received a grant that will fund Mimio boards and media projectors which will replace, among other things, overhead projectors.

Principal O'Neill received a translation grant from SOMEF once again, to allow us to reach our non-English speaking families by translating flyers, notices, a bi-monthly newsletter, and other written materials into Spanish and Haitian Creole. As the elementary school which houses our district's English Language Learning population, this kind of outreach is crucial to our student's success and to our effort to make all families welcome.

School social worker Lindy Rollo received funds to support Increase the Peace, her newly formed anti-bullying club. The group will discourage bullying by creating and training a student group in anti-bullying practices. This group will then bring the strategies to their peers through skits, mediation, and discussion.

Lastly, Clinton was also the recipient of grants that are shared with other elementary schools in our district. These support our K-3 Reading Buddies program, our Invention Convention workshops, our evening program for K and 1<sup>st</sup> grade students and parents, a program that celebrates diversity through literature, and the purchase of active seating equipment for students with attention and/or postural challenges.

Thanks to our teachers for creating these worthwhile initiatives and to SOMEF for providing the funds for their implementation.—*Cecelia Cancellaro*


