FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Well Clinton Community, it is hard to believe that we are half way through our 2007-2008 school year. And what a year it has been so far! We have worked hard together to help all our students become the best learners and citizens they can be. Between our very dedicated and talented staff, our incredibly caring and talented families, and the hard work and pride of our students, we are well on our way to achieving our goals. We have work ahead of us, but we have proven that together we can accomplish many things.

I would like to thank you all for signing in when you come into the building. It is so important for us to keep our students and staff safe. We also ask you to make sure your children are not on the school grounds before 8:25 am. Students who are getting breakfast should go to the cafeteria no earlier than 8:05. They must remain there until 8:25. There is no supervision outside before 8:25. Thanks.

During the next few weeks, we will be preparing our students for their standardized testing. We will be sharing sample tests with them and making sure they understand how to take the tests. We have added two recess clubs for those students who might benefit from extra test prep practice and/or homework help. We are using our Study Island software program (which can also be accessed from home) for the Study Island club. The Practice for Success club will focus on homework and/or reading assistance. Preparing our students for the tests does not mean we will be replacing our curriculum. We will continue to implement our curriculum and focus on their continued learning, not teaching to the test. We need to stay focused on our academics and related arts to prepare them for next year. We thank you for helping them understand that test scores are just one part of who they are as students.

Speaking of who they are as students, how lucky are they to be part of our growing global community? Walk Around the World will showcase how diverse we are and how this diversity enhances our students' lives. What a tribute to Clinton School! Without the foresight of Cecelia Cancellaro and the leadership of Cecelia and Leah Gomberg, along with the extraordinary talents of all involved, the nation would not recognize the greatness of our Clinton Community.

As we celebrate African American History Month, students will research and share in the great work and contributions of past and present Black Americans. Clinton School is very proud to help Miles Trojian (second grade) celebrate the extraordinary life of his great Aunt, Althea Gibson. We also have a beautiful display of information and artifacts in our front hallway.

AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

February is the month when our nation celebrates the rich cultural heritage of African Americans, and evidence of their contributions to our society fill our first floor display case. You will see images of African American astronauts, business men and women, and in this election year, presidential candidates, past and present.

Some of the display items are also connected to our Clinton School family. I recently met descendants of the late, great tennis star, Althea Gibson. Many of us know that Gibson was the first African American to win Wimbledon in 1957 and again in 1958. This led the way for Arthur Ashe's win in 1975, Venus Williams' victories in 2000, 2001, and 2005, and Serena Williams' triumphs in 2002 and 2003. However, in talking with Clinton mom, Crishan Trojian, who is the niece of the niece of the late tennis star, I learned that Gibson was also an author, actress, golf enthusiast, and can you believe, a singer!

The Trojian family is also connected to Rainbow Coalition founder and former presidential candidate the Reverend Jesse Jackson. Eric Trojian worked on the presidential campaigns for Jackson in 1984, 1988, and 1992 and was kind enough to share memorabilia. We are truly grateful to the Trojian family for sharing their artifacts and family legacy. Theirs and similar stories enrich the lives of our Clinton families year round.

KINDERGARTEN

Ms. Cosmas's kindergarten class has enjoyed keeping in touch with a former student whose family recently moved to Japan. The class has been visiting the student's family blog and sending e-mail. Students have enjoyed learning about Japan and recently they took a virtual tour of their former classmate's new school. They also learned that the student's family recently rode on the largest ferris wheel in the world and also (bravely) tasted octopus!

FIRST GRADE

Mrs. Motz's first-grade class has been studying and researching a group of aquatic, flightless birds: penguins. Among the facts students have learned is that all penguins live south of the equator. For upcoming lessons, students will be learning about how to make healthy food choices. This investigation will culminate with the planning and sharing of a nutritious breakfast. Students have also begun the homework assignment called Night Writing. They are writing every Monday and Wednesday about anything they desire. They can write short stories, comic strips, or poetry, to name a few. These first graders are on their way to becoming future guest authors at Clinton School. Mrs. Edelberg had better book them now!

SECOND GRADE

Mrs. Hall's second-grade class has been busy for the past few months. In October, Timur M.'s parents visited the class and taught students about the solar system. A highlight for November was the family project that each student had to complete and in December Mason S.'s parents came in to share some live music to celebrate the holidays. Also that month, Lubaba B.'s mother shared a lesson on Eid-al-Adha, and Bijoux R.'s grandmother and father taught a lesson in connection with Christmas. As part of the lesson, students made holiday cards for U.S. soldiers serving in Iraq. Finally, Ruby B.'s mother visited and made holiday crafts with the class.

FOURTH GRADE

The fourth graders recently went on a field trip to the Dreyfuss Planetarium at the Newark Museum where they were treated to views of planets, constellations, meteorites, comets, and asteroids. They especially enjoyed the experience of how it felt to be an astronaut inside of a spacecraft. They then solved a Carmen San Diego mystery with the help of satellites.

FOURTH AND FIFTH GRADE ENRICHMENT

The Enrichment students here at Clinton School are concluding their grade level units in both language arts and math. The 4th graders in language arts studied various cultural myths from around the world. Projects were displayed earlier with some fabulous scientific and mythological explanations of natural phenomenon. In math, the 4th graders concluded their study of topology, a strand of geometry, which has broadened their understanding of space. They have seen the world through the eyes of engineers and cartographers, to name just a few. As for the 5th grade language arts class, they are preparing for our final criminal trial, which will decide the fate of two famous fairytale characters. The verdict has not been reached as of this writing, but the suspense and team determination is building! Final projects for our 5 grade math students can be viewed on our bulletin board. Originally created number base systems are exhibited, demonstrating examples of spectacular math skills found at Clinton School. All of the Enrichment students have met their tasks with success. Now it's on to further exciting challenges!

SPECIAL WINTER CONCERT

The Clinton School Winter Concert will take place on **Thursday, February 14th, at 9:30 am and 1:45 pm** in the auditorium. The morning assembly will be for grades 3-5 plus morning kindergarten. GETTING TO KNOW SECOND-GRADE TEACHER BETH FRASCELLA

We recently sat down for a chat with Beth Frascella, who this year made the switch from teaching first grade to co-teaching second grade with an ESL teacher. Here's what she has to say.

Where were you born and raised? Where did you go to school? I was born in Summit, went to school in Livingston, and got a B.A. from Seton Hall. But I'm not done with school—I'm currently taking courses online for my master's degree to be a reading specialist. I love it!

How long have you been teaching? A long time. I started out as a substitute teacher in Ohio, then moved back to New Jersey and taught preschool in Chatham and half-day kindergarten at Seth Boyden. In 2002 there was a first-grade position opening at Clinton, and Mr. Rhinehart, who was the principal at that time, asked me if I would consider interviewing. The rest is history.

I heard that one of your fellow second-grade teachers at Clinton is a former student of yours. Is that true? Yes. I had done my student teaching at Tuscan and at the end of the year, the fourth graders wrote me a thank-you letter. One of the students who signed it was named Janine Guida—that's the maiden name of my colleague Janine Poutre! I didn't realize it until I found the letter recently.

Why did you switch from teaching first grade to second grade? Last year when Mr. Katz was principal, he asked me to think about moving to second grade, where I'd be co-teaching with an ESL teacher. I realized I would get a chance to put into practice some of the ideas that the kindergarten and first-grade teachers and I had been discussing about how to better help students in the ESL program. So I accepted.

Has it been challenging? Any change to what's familiar is challenging. But I've discovered over the years that I really do thrive on challenges. I love to learn and try new things.

Why did you decide to become a teacher? I think I was just born one! I was the child who gathered all the younger children on my block and set up a classroom in the garage to play school.

What qualities make you good at it? (Don't be modest!) I'm a good listener. I end each day mulling over what went right and what would I want to do differently. And I hope my enthusiasm for learning is contagious. Also, I take cues from my students. As much as I know what and how to teach the prescribed curriculum, if a lesson just isn't working, I readjust to meet the students' needs.

Why is your personality suited to teaching young kids? I'm a pretty laid-back person, one who truly appreciates and recognizes the individual in a person. Each child has unique thoughts, interests, and abilities, and I am genuinely interested in getting to know them on that level.

What's your biggest challenge on a typical school day? Trying to squeeze in all of the things I have to do—and want to do—before the bell rings at 3 pm.

Brian Osborne has talked about how one of his former teachers significantly influenced his life. Who most influenced yours? This is a hard one. There have been a few defining moments in my life, all involving different people. But, honestly, I think the most influential were my three children. When they came along, they changed the whole landscape of my life and my husband's and put everything into perspective.

Does anything about the job still surprise you? Answering your questions, I find it surprising that I still feel so very passionate about what I do, as if I was starting my first day of teaching! I guess that's the beauty of it—every day is a new start, with new things to learn and discover, sprinkled with twists and turns.

NOTES FROM THE NURSE

NEWS FROM PAC (JANUARY '08)

The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) provides a forum for interaction between the principal and parents. Parents not on the committee may submit items for discussion through any committee member.

The following topics were discussed at the January meeting:

- **1. Bullying:** A PAC member brought up an issue regarding several 4th graders engaging in bullying toward a peer. Principal O'Neill indicated that she is aware of the students involved and has been working with them to resolve this problem.
- 2. <u>Doors</u>: A question was brought to the membership regarding the length of time the doors are left open in the morning. The safety patrol determines how long the doors will remain open. The doors are not to be left open for the entire time between the first and second bell.
- **3.** <u>Teacher Replacement:</u> Principal O'Neill indicated that a maternity leave replacement has been finalized for Ms. Pomares's class. A formal announcement will be forthcoming.
- **4.** Class Parents and PAC: As a follow-up to our last meeting, the utilization of class parents to facilitate the communication of PAC issues and agenda items was discussed, the goal of which is to extrapolate ideas and to increase participation of parents as stakeholders in the development of PAC agendas and action plans. Toward that end, the PAC representatives of each grade will disseminate a letter reaching out to class parents prior to the monthly meeting.
- **4.** <u>Ice:</u> An issue was brought to the membership regarding icy conditions on the school grounds during a recent weather event. The particular event in question was an unusual weather situation, however. Facilities staff along with Ms. O'Neill work diligently to insure that the walkways are cleared of snow and ice during inclement weather. Parents with specific concerns are encouraged to contact central administration as the number of custodians available to clear the snow is controlled by them.
